

Annual Review 2021–22: Nick Maclean FRICS, Interim Chair of Governing Council statement

Informed by extensive stakeholder consultation, the Review's proposals were far-reaching, aiming to clarify RICS' purpose and make proposals on its governing structure, culture and future strategy.

RICS' Governing Council has strongly endorsed the recommendations, and in implementing them is working at pace to change RICS into an institution that works effectively and sustainably, in which both members and the public at large continue to have confidence.

I am grateful for the positive engagement of members throughout this at times challenging process.

I am also delighted at the lead members are taking in overseeing and implementing these reforms.

Whether participating in member-led steering groups or taking an active role to convene and coordinate activity amongst fellow professionals in their regions in collaboration with RICS staff, members are bringing all their insight, expertise and passion to refocusing RICS to become the institution that they and the public demand and deserve.

I have no doubt that this profound but essential transformation will ensure RICS can sustainably deliver its public interest obligations, restore trust amongst members and inspire the next generation of professionals to play their part in delivering a more sustainable and resilient future.

From a year that has seen great progress in equipping RICS and its members to face the future prepared and resilient, I look forward to seeing continued progress in delivering confidence for all the communities we serve in the years ahead.
